



Happy Friday! I hope everyone enjoyed a wonderful Fall Break last week. It was fun to hear about some of the adventures your children went on while we were away from school.



Did you know?

As I mentioned in the last Friday Note, I am going to spend some time sharing details about our *Parent Partnership* pillar. I would again like to invite everyone

to look at our [Hand-in-Hand Guidebook](#). My hope is that by sharing this, we can create a common vision and understand how things “work” at Traut, what to do when we have concerns, and how to ensure that our partnerships remain strong.

Before the break, I shared “Step 1” – Unity in a shared mission and vision. Today, I want to share “Step 2” – The fundamental importance of mutual respect.

From the guidebook:

“Before a working relationship even begins, the fundamental attitude from each student, teacher, and parent is one of mutual respect for the valuable role the other person brings to the partnership.

Teachers will remember that " ... every child's first and most important teachers are his or her parents. Our school exists to supplement and support the learning that is started in the home. " (TCKS Covenant) **Parents** will remember that "This partnership includes the responsibility to support the school staff and provide good examples of behavior and work habits for their children. " (TCKS Covenant) **Parents** will remember that the teacher is the final authority on all matters within the classroom. The **teachers** will remember that parents retain the final responsibility when it comes to their individual children. In the case of a conflict, the way the partners interact with each other should not undermine the authority of the other individual. **Parents** will be respectful of the teachers' privacy as it relates to their desks and personal property. **Teachers** will be respectful of the privacy and confidentiality of the parents and students with regard to personal family matters. **Parents and teachers** will respect confidentiality with regard to personnel records and student records and files.”

Mutual respect is the glue that holds our partnerships together and keeps us strong.

Families with incoming Kindergarten(2023-24) and outgoing 5th graders: IMPORTANT

The first-round school choice window is open now! Siblings who will attend Traut next year **MUST** submit a school of choice application. If your 5th grader plans to

attend Kinard Middle School, you also MUST submit a school of choice application for Kinard.

The Traut Lego Robotic Challenge teams competed at the city qualifying tournament at Poudre High School on 11/12. They went head-to-head with 22 other 4th-8th grade teams. The Lego Princesses and Energy Hounds both qualified for the state tournament next week in Denver.

The Lego Princesses won the Champion's Award 1st place trophy. They also won the Robot Performance Award 2nd place trophy. Coached by Lance Celli, the Lego

The Energy Hounds won the Robot Performance Award 1st place trophy. They also won the Innovation Project Award 2nd place trophy. For me, December is a time that I seem to “look back” and reflect on the year. I do believe that taking the time to be reflective, especially in the field of education, is critically important.
