Change is hard. I know this is not news, but at this time of year, as we start thinking and planning for the next school year, there are always changes that must be made. Sometimes there

are new rules or regulations that we must address. Sometimes a beloved colleague decides it is time to retire. Sometimes we get a new literacy curriculum. Sometimes we need to change to be able to do what's best for our students.

I am guilty of letting suffering get in my way when it comes to change, but a friend and fellow principal shared the quote, above, with me on Thursday and it really got me thinking. Change is inevitable but suffering is optional. If we (or if I) change the way I think about the situation, it can transform from something hard/unpleasant into something positive. As I think about some of the changes we have had to make over the last few years, there are innovative solutions that came from each. We are able to do things more efficiently now than before, and this would not be the case if we hadn't had to make some changes. We have made instructional shifts that have propelled student growth, and that would not have happened without change.

As the season changes to spring, and we begin to think about the changes that will happen next year, I encourage all of us to focus on what we can innovate rather than our potential suffering or the discomfort that comes from a change in our routines. If nothing else, it will help us feel better about what we are facing, and I think we can all agree that less suffering is better than more.
